Q. How do I apply to college?

A. The application process varies depending on the school you are applying to, as some may require an application through the school itself, or through an application known as the Common Application. This allows you to just fill out one application, and send it to your desired schools online. If you ever get stuck, I highly suggest seeing your guidance counselor as they know the process well.

Q. How do I know where to apply?

A. Find what you like! Look into what programs the school offers. Do you want to major in English? Make sure you find a school that offers that major. Some schools are small and have a small teacher-to-student ratio, and some hold lectures of more than 400 students. When applying to a school match what you would like and would find most beneficial to your education and you will find the right school. Make sure to go to the school too! Campus visits are very helpful because you can see the classrooms, the feel of the school and the environment you're going to be in!

Not only do you get a little help with your college expenses, but you also make many great connections!
